**9. Criteria for admission to the programme**

The University's standard entry requirement is 240 to 280 UCAS tariff points (or less if only two A levels). Offers may be made towards the lower end of this scale for entry onto the BA International Politics and Law.

Mature applicants with relevant experience and qualifications, including access course qualifications are also welcomed, provided they can show evidence of ability to benefit from the programme.

International students who have not been taught in the English medium must show evidence of proven ability in English such as TOEFL grade 550 or IELTS grade 6.0.

University policies supporting students with disabilities apply, as described in the University Regulations 'Information for students with disabilities'.

**10. Aims of the programme**

The programme aims to:

- provide students with a solid grounding in the key themes, concepts and theories relevant to international politics and law which will aid them in their future careers;
- enhance review and search skills and develop specialist in-depth critical understanding of topics of student interest;
- provide students with innovative and up to date core curricula through a continual process of reviewing and updating in line with both international developments in politics and law and staff research interests;
- give students access to a broad intellectual environment through the provision of innovative teaching and extra-curricular events;
- provide the opportunity for experiential learning and career development through direct participation in political and legal activities through work placement and other forms of practical engagement with the world.

## 12. Programme structure (levels, modules, credits and progression requirements)

### 12. 1 Overall structure of the programme

The BA International Politics and Law (Hons) Programme is made up of year-long thirty credit modules.

#### **Full-time Three Year Mode**

##### **Year One**

The first year introduces students to the basic concepts of politics and political ideologies (**POI1001**) and international development issues (**POI1010**) which is balanced with an introduction to law (**LAW1101**) and public law (**LAW1107**).

##### **Year Two**

Second year focuses on embedding students and enhances the understanding of international political theories and concepts (**POI2001**) and the international legal basis of human rights (**LAW2465**) and relates them to the international social, economic, and political context in which they operate. Students also select one option from a law list - Equality and the Law, Jurisprudence and the EU Internal Market – and one option from a politics list – Comparative Politics, Global Political Economy, Politics of Europe or Approaches to Research in Social Science. The latter module must be selected if students choose to take the politics based Dissertation in their final year (**POI3330**).

##### **Year Three**

Third year combines critical understanding of the aspects of public international law as well as concepts and theories of global and regional geopolitics with statecraft and legal practice in international politics. Students will take the core module in Geopolitics

(**POI3608**) alongside Public International Law (**LAW3181**) in their final year. In addition, students can choose one optional module from a list of law (**List C**) modules and one from a list of politics and social science modules (**List D**)

***Part-time Mode (Over Six Years)***

***Year One***

In the first year, two compulsory 30 credit year-long modules are taken, Introduction to Politics and Introduction to Law, which are the building blocks of the BA Programme.

***Year Two***

Two compulsory 30 credit year-long law modules which introduce two of the substantive subjects, Public Law and Introduction to Development are taken in this year.

***Year Three***

The Level 5 compulsory modules, Theories of International Relations and UK and European Human Rights are taken in this year.

***Year Four***

Two optional modules from list A and B are taken in Year 4.

***Year Five***

The Level 6 compulsory modules **POI3608** Geopolitics: Critical Perspectives and Issues and **LAW3181** Public International Law are taken.

**15. Placement opportunities, requirements and support (if applicable)**

Students may choose to undertake a placement year during their third year, and then return to Middlesex for the final (fourth) year. The Placement Office provides information and guidance on obtaining placements.

Students must complete 240 credits before starting a placement and obtain the written permission of the BA International Politics and Law Programme Leader. This will only be given if the placement is considered to be of sufficient standing.

A placement adds an extra year onto the BA International Politics and Law degree.

**16. Future careers (if applicable)**

The BA International Politics and Law degree is not a qualifying degree for purposes of exemption from the academic stage of training for the legal professions. However, it does provide a basis for a variety of careers in the administrative, professional and business fields, particularly those with an international focus related to politics and law.

Successful BA International Politics and Law graduates who wish to pursue a career in the legal profession may be eligible to take the Common Professional Examination/ Graduate Diploma in Law.
